The Saturday Interview: Karamea Area School's Dean Rainev

Dean Rainey is the new Principal of Karamea Area School and I caught up with him last weekend to hear his vision for 2021 and how he intends to build on previous successes (more on that to follow in the next issue).

Dean and his wife, Meryn, and twin boys Theo and Cody, moved to Karamea from Whangamata at the end of 2020 into their new house in the Karamea Township. Dean has spent the last 14 years teaching in Vietnam and Saudi, as well as New Zealand. They moved back to New Zealand in 2015 when Meryn found out she was expecting their now 5 -year-old sons. Dean has seen a fair amount of different school management and teaching systems and remarked that "I've seen both good and bad school systems". The school in Saudi had excellent teaching, and management systems, he said.

I asked him how Karamea compared to his last school in Whangamata, a small town (pop 8000) in the Coromandel, roughly 150kms southeast of Auckland and whether there were any obvious differences or observations of note so far. "What I have observed is that the kids here in Karamea are great", he said. "Karamea is quaint, it's boutique-like". He went on to tell me that the school roll in his previous school jumped from 340 to 550 as families moved away from Auckland because of escalating house prices. "Schools in larger towns and cities may have their multimillion-dollar facilities, as we will have too soon, but

Karamea has so much more on offer". Dean continued. He went on to say that we have the Kahurangi National Park on our doorstep, we have fishing, rafting, kayaking and great surfing in Little Wanganui. "Karamea is not missing out on anything," he said. "I want the kids here to learn about their natural environment, ecology, and to fully appreciate what's actually on their doorstep".

Schools often report that outcomes improve when students are more engaged and so I asked Dean if he would like to see students offered a range of opportunities, such as educational visits to places of interest, projects with local businesses, and reward trips. Dean said he was all for education outside of the classroom, "There is a plethora of evidence that certainly suggests kids do learn very well learning outside the classroom". Furthermore, he said that he would like to see the school move to a more student-led education. Interestingly, he's looking at making one of the old teacher's flats into a common room for the senior students, but explained that they will decide and ultimately make decisions on how it will be designed. "If children are educated properly they can create their own jobs, be more entrepreneurial, and take control over their future endeavours". He is also very supportive of the West Coast Trades Academy, attended by some senior students stating that "Not every child needs to go to tertiary education. Additionally there are plenty of people doing financially well from working in the trades, without a student loan".

I asked him what his thoughts were on Quality Learning Environments, and he said that he's "on the fence, as teachers working in these QLEs need to be upskilled, need to see it done properly, and trained accordingly". The IB school in Hanoi Dean taught at had a sliding

door between his music class and the art class, which made collaboration between performing arts and visual arts easier, however at times, "The art teacher did need to close the sliding door when we got too noisy!" he remarked.


As most of our readers will know, Karamea Area School will be completely rebuilt this year. The new school will have 3 larger learning spaces with integrated break out rooms and learning pods for more flexibility. It will have a new Multipurpose Gymnasium which will include dressing rooms and music room. Dean, who is passionate about music, would also like to incorporate a band academy, recording studio, and possibly even a Little Wanganui surf team depending on student interest. He pointed out that flexible learning spaces can be modified depending on how the leadership changes over the years (hopefully not for many years Dean!)

I asked him how he intends to go about recruiting staff, which can be a challenge for rural schools. "I intend to shoulder tap," he said, "and be really proactive". He went on to say that he will go to graduation days at Universities if needed, to recruit the best staff. "We do need diverse educators though; youth and enthusiasm are great but so are age and experience".

We also touched on the subject of community and I asked Dean how much importance he placed on the community in view of Karamea's limited infrastructure, its geographical isolation, and limited work opportunities. "Community is so important with each person or family having their own needs met....and we need to respect that".

He would like to see opportunities at the school open to the community as well, creating a community learning hub. For example, if the school was hosting a defensive driving course it would be open to the community as well as students. He also went on to say that he would love to see more adult learning happen again.

Thank you to Dean and Meryn for talking to the Chronicle. In the coming issues, we will bring you results of this year's Level 1-3 NCEA and interviews with the new staff appointments.

Happy dishes!

Today I have some tips about dish washing liquid savings at home. Up until now, I hadn't found a good way of making my own dish washing liquid efficiently enough for greasy dishes. I then decided to class my dishes into three different categories and use different soap for each of them.

WHΔΤ'S ON ΚΔRΔΜΕΔ

N°1 - Light dishes (Everything that requires just a small clean like tea and coffee cups, plunger, glasses etc.)

I fill my sink with hot water and just add a teaspoon of baking soda.

N°2 - General dishes (All the dishes that need a decent clean but are not greasy like pots, plates, cutlery, non-greasy pans, bowls etc.)

I fill my sink with hot water and add a bit of the liquid castile

soap bar that has been soaked in hot water in a big glass jar (same recipe that what we saw previously for the laundry powder). I keep on filling this jar with water and give a mix until there is no trace of soap (it take few months).



N°3 - Greasy dishes (All the pans used for frying vegetables or meat, as well as other oily or buttery dishes.

I fill my sink with hot water and I have to finally use commercial dish washing liquid from Ecostore (can be found in bulk shop to refill bottles) previously diluted in water in a bottle.

Of course, let's remember that the really hot hot water is enough on itself to take the grease away without using any soap!

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



BDC Rates Review Community Response

Many of us have recently received from Buller District Council (BDC) proposed Rates Review including a sample invoice on what our future annual rates maybe should proposal to update current rating system to a more streamlined platform be adopted. I totally understand and indeed support council in this Rates Review as outlined within in their brochure given this began in 2014 and again in 2017.

However, I am struggling to understand and very confused why some of our ratepayers within our community <u>may see</u> annual rates increases ranging between 20% to 170% and worse still inequities between neighbours and similar property types.

It's a fact of life there will always be rates increases not just for the Buller Region but throughout the country. On average most councils will adopt an annual rate increase of between 3% and 10% depending on circumstances. But this proposal is a change of the rating system (not an annual increase) so BDC have a lot more work to do before proceeding to change their platform. Yes, rates are complicated as brochure outlines but any changes need to reflect fairness moving forward. I am no expert but believe BDC will need to include a few more differential categories classifications than the nine (9) proposed to ensure fairness is achieved for all ratepayers. This approach will still achieve a better outcome for us all in simplifying system from the current 42 categories. Council will also need to update a few more property type classifications again to enhance fairness between property owners.

Rates is an emotive subject and clearly given feedback on our local community Facebook pages some of our community are understandably very concerned and upset on proposed changes.

However, as a ratepayer facing 170% increase I am trying to keep calm and collective on this sensitive subject and encourage those impacted to do the same. This is just a review process and I expect and hope BDC will take on our invaluable feedback and concerns to make key changes to achieve the fairness aspect we all expect and deserve.

I will on behalf of our community prepare a Community Submission to cover off key issues along with a constructive positive petition. I encourage those impacted to also complete your own individual submission which is required by BDC no later than 4.30pm Friday 19th February.

BDC have scheduled a one on one catch up with ratepayers to be held between 4pm and 6pm at the RSA Centre on the 2nd February.

In addition to this one on one with council I have requested BDC to also host a community meeting with key council staff. Can I ask you please to do the same by politely emailing ratesreview@bdc.govt.nz to also request a community meeting. Hopefully with many emails sent BDC will respond and come up for a visit and chat. A meeting like this would be very helpful for both council and ratepayers as a brochure can never explain the total picture.

I have also set a new Facebook page – "Karamea/Little Wanganui Rates Review Forum" and invite you to share with me feedback and details of your proposed rate increases so I can also collate this data and include in my community submission to demonstrate the massive variances and inequities.

Final Rates proposal needs to be fair, realistic and logical. Personally as a ratepayer I need to accept there will be an increase and will take this on the chin as long as the updated system provides fairness to us all. This is only my personal point of view and I respect many of you may not agree and I get that. However, I've learnt in my life if we constantly dig our toes in and not work towards a workable compromise then the final outcome ends up worse from where we started.

Rosalie Sampson, our local councillor, has stated that if anyone has a concern about the Proposed Rate Review, they are welcome to ring her on 7826-745 to discuss their concerns.

The 'Williamstown' Pear Tree



On the Oparara Block Road there lives a pear tree, well over 100 years old. It grew next to Mr and Mrs William's house in what was nicknamed 'Williamstown'. The descendants of this couple, some of whom still live in Karamea, still fondly remember this tree.

The name 'Williamstown' came about because when the children of this couple got married, they in turn lived in their own homesteads in close proximity to the family home and the pear tree. Start the year with a plan – an emergency plan!

In early December, Erica Andrews (Emergency Management Officer - Buller District

Group Public Information Manager) and Sean Judd (Buller District Council) hosted a Civil Defence meeting, the first in a series that will take place over the course of 2021.

Being relatively new to Karamea, we attended the meeting to find out what is in place should a disaster strike and, most importantly, what we should be doing to be ready in the event of an emergency. If 2020 has shown us anything, it's that "anything" can and does happen. As Erica said, it is not a case of 'if' an emergency event will happen in Karamea, but 'when". Flooding or earthquake could cut off Karamea for quite some time and being prepared is paramount to get you through the first days (and maybe even weeks) following a major event. The West Coast Emergency Management team monitor weather and earthquake events 24/7, with plans in place to assist the districts should a disaster strike.

It was reassuring to see the great work that has already been done with getting the Karamea Community Response Plan to a user-friendly, yet robust and in-depth plan, that is all but ready to be finalised – thanks to the team that worked so hard behind the scenes to get it to this stage. All it is waiting for is 'YOU' – our remote and thriving community needs someone to step up and be the Civil Defence Lead Coordinator for the Karamea district. Sometimes, the hardest part of volunteering is just making the commitment – and a bit of practice 'juggling time'!

The key point to come out of the meeting was that "the best plan is your own plan". Are **you** prepared? Do you have a battery-operated radio, are the batteries working, do you have sufficient water, food and warm clothing ready to grab? Where will you go depending on the emergency? Who will you contact?



Chicken Corn Soup

This is a very quick to make soup that is one of my all time favourites, it's thick, creamy (but with no cream!), sweet from the corn, hearty and soul warming. You can add greens to it, my favourite being broccoli, spinach or silverbeet to make it a complete meal. Though this recipe is made with chicken, it is easily made vegetarian/vegan by omitting the chicken & egg.

Ingredients:

2 cups (500ml) chicken or vegetable broth/stock

1 tin (410g) creamed corn

1 tsp Soy or Organic Tamari Sauce

1 tbsp cooking wine/ Dry Sherry (can omit)

1 tsp ginger, minced or finely chopped

1 garlic clove, minced or finely chopped

1 tsp cornflour, mixed with a slash of cold water

1 egg, whisked (can omit)

1 cup shredded cooked chicken (can omit)

Salt and pepper, to taste

Pinch of Chilli Flakes (optional) 3 tbsp sliced Spring Onions (optional)



Instructions:

- Place broth, creamed corn, soy sauce, cooking wine/Sherry, ginger, garlic and cornflour, put mixture in a saucepan over high heat.
- Bring to boil, then turn down the heat to medium and stir occasionally. Cook for 5 minutes or until slightly thickened.
- Turn off heat, and slowly whisk in the egg so it cooks in "ribbons" throughout the soup. This also thickens the soup.
- Add the chicken, season with pepper, and serve, garnished with Spring Onions.

Recipe Notes:

- 1. You can finish it off with a drizzle of sesame oil. Sesame oil goes fabulously with this recipe.
- 2. The soup freezes well, but it is best to leave out the cornflour slurry and add that in when reheating. This is because things thickened with cornflour tend to be a bit watery once frozen (fridge is ok, does not cause this effect). Not massively watery, because the corn and egg are thickeners too, but it isn't quite as thick. Or if you are freezing the leftovers, just add a little bit more cornflour when reheating, if you want to thicken it slightly.

Gardening Tips

With January being one of the main harvesting times, lots of delicious summer crops will be ready to harvest and it's the perfect time to plant more to ensure a continued supply!

If you go away on holiday, organise someone to water your plants while you are away.

Potatoes:

For main crops still in the ground, mould up soil around the leaves to encourage more tubers and to keep the sun off them. A side-dressing of organic potato food will give them a boost.

If aphids and whitefly are still a problem, try a gentle blasting with a hose or organic spray.

Add a layer of mulch around the base of fruit trees to maintain moisture and keep the area weed free.



Flowers:




Plant petunias, impatiens, calendula, dahlias, echinacea, verbascum, verbena, alyssum, cosmos, gaillardia, marigolds, nemesia, dahlias.

Apply fertiliser to flower beds and pots and containers to replenish nutrients.

Fertilise roses.

Capsicums:



Stake taller plants and those grown in wind-prone areas.



Celery:



Crisp, sweet, fresh celery is a must to have in the vegetable patch. It's super easy to grow and thrives in both warm and cold seasons. Celery is a versatile vegetable and an essential crop for any foodie's garden and kitchen.

All parts of celery can be used, from the leaves to the stems and the roots. Young celery has a sweeter flavour and is often used fresh, while the older stems and leaves are more often cooked.
