## Karamea's first school - South Terrace 1875 - 77

When our early settlers took ship in London and Plymouth in the UK in 1874, they have must have experienced a whole gamut of emotions from trepidation to excitement and exhilaration at the emigration agents offer of a 'free fare to a better life,' in a country where they would be 'treated with respect by others.'

Although some 100,000 immigrants poured into New Zealand in the decade starting in 1870 most could not even afford the cost of getting their families to the embarkation docks, let alone purchasing the daunting list of clothing and supplies they were recommended to take with them. However, the New Zealand government was prepared to advance the cost of the journey to the immigrants upon the signing of promissory notes. Ironically, this meant that the immigrants left for their so-called "promised land" already in debt! With many of the immigrants from the Midlands already out of work after being 'locked out' by the Duke of Bedford for asking for a pay rise (the early beginnings of unionism), and those from Shetland suffocated by landlords who controlled both their crofts and fisheries, their thoughts must have echoed Rod Stewart's sentiments some 100 plus years later - 'we are sailing' .....'to be free!'

After a rough 3 month voyage one can only imagine their thoughts to find that in Nelson, their 'promised land', there was no work, and nowhere to live apart from the newly built asylum. So that in November when the Nelson Provincial Government called for immigrants to become part of a new 'special settlement' at Karamea, they jumped at the chance, the men enthusiastically volunteering to help establish the settlement before getting their wives and children to join them. Again, it must have felt like a slap in the face to find nothing at Karamea except for 50,000 acres of dense bush, ('we had to cut the trees down before we could see the sky or pitch our tents', wrote Thomas Lineham) with the steamer sailing out on the 10 o'clock tide

next morning! It says something for their guts and determination to envision a future for their families in such a remote and isolated area – to clear land and roadlines, build rough dwellings, and work for themselves, rather than for a landlord. To start afresh. At this stage they were not aware that the land they had been allotted on the South Terrace was pakihi, and worthless for agriculture.

One of the settlers first priorities was to set up a school for their children. On the voyage out to New Zealand on the *Ocean Mail*, concerned wife and mother Helen Laurenson from Shetland spent some time teaching the youngsters all she was able, and did the same once they were all established in the new settlement. However, in January 1875, scarcely weeks after the women and children had joined their menfolk, the Nelson Education Board minutes stated that the Board would provide *'books and maps gratuitously'* to a new school at Karamea, but although sympathetic to their objectives, would not finance a school building as that was the responsibility of the Nelson Provincial Government.



Not to be deterred, the settlers set about building a basic schoolroom on the south western boundary of

the South Terrace settlement on designated Education Reserve land, opening it in June 1875.

Laurence Johnson wrote...'The framework was constructed of round saplings. Round saplings were placed as uprights close together and nailed to the frame. The roof was framed as a gable and thin saplings as purlins were fixed to the rafters.... Kie kie was used to thatch the roof, and made a waterproof covering. The ends of the green leaves hung dwn insidr, and it looked like a green house..... All interstices were corked with moss... to serve as windows openings were left in the walls and covered with calico. Rough benches sufficed for tables and seats...the floor was earthen...'
The first teachers were Mr and Mrs Naylor, the Immigration Records listing John Naylor as a

schoolmaster from Yorkshire.

Young Charles Lineham enjoyed his schooldays and wrote that there were great heaps of logs and scrub all around to play on, and 'once a week we were taken outside and taught to sing rounds and glees.'

John Laurenson in later years told his children that he learned to write his first letters with burnt bones on pieces of bark .'This ... led to speculation as to the origin of the bones! Were they those of the poor goats which met an untimely death after being specially imported to provide milk for the children? There was great jubilation on the day of their arrival at the settlement... but that very evening, put out to graze by unsuspecting settlers, the goats ate tutu and died!'

Inspector of Public Schools from the Nelson Education Board, W C Hodgson, gave the isolated little South Terrace School a glowing report, despite the fear and dread his annual visits engendered in both teachers and pupils alike. His official comments were published for all to see in the press of the day, although his visits were frequently hampered by prolonged spells of atrocious weather as he endeavoured to visit the 'almost inaccessible schools that are now in nearly every bay and ravine in the Nelson Province.'

In March 1876, Inspector Hodgson reported to the Nelson Education Board...

'Karamea: Mrs Naylor (35). The teacher of this remote and almost inaccessible school, has contrived in a short space of time and under unusual difficulties, to produce excellent results. When I examined the school

at the end of March, it had been open only nine months.

The 35 children present were huddled together in a room measuring only 15 feet by 9 feet. Yet the older scholars read fairly, wrote tolerably well from dictation, and worked money questions very correctly, not one in the class failing to pass second standard. The other class were equally well taught, and all the scholars were remarkably well drilled and orderly.'


Great praise from an Inspector who fitted the stereotype of a dragon whose visits were to be feared, and whose pithy to-the-point comments could destroy a teachers reputation at one stroke. Few schools in the Buller escaped a tongue-lashing. Moreover, he held the opinion that girls were inferior to boys, who were more apt learners! This was at a time when many of the students would have been nearly as old as the young teachers doing their best to cope in what must have been extraordinarily difficult conditions.

However, the settlers on the terrace were not faring so well -Susannah Hawes wrote 'I simply sat down on a log and wept' An infrequent steamer service and lack of supplies, a 'truck' system operating at the government store which meant no money ever changed hands, what they saw as favouritism and the unfair allocation of work on the part of the overseer of the settlement these were some of the concerns that led the settlers to petition for an official Inquiry into conditions on the South Terrace, apart from the poor soil which would barely grow a crop. Some of these concerns were dealt with, but the future looked brighter when the 'special settlement' scheme was wound up and the settlement passed under the control of the Buller County Council. Moreover, some of the more adventurous settlers had discovered good land on the river flats. By the end of 1877 the settlers had abandoned their allotted sections of their own accord, and moved down into the valley and what they saw, finally, as their 'Promised Land.' Thomas Lineham wrote ' if this is bush life. I dont mind it a hit!'

Karamea was finally becoming a reality, and as the settlement spread the settlers once again began the quest for good schooling for their kids, in what they considered, like Dave Dobbyn, was a 'slice of heaven.'

All that remains of their first school is a rough chunk of timber and a few hand-forged nails. The cross road back to the school site with

ditches either side, as built by the settlers, is still there, but now buried under manuka and gorse and scrub!

Group.




A leisurely afternoon tea followed at the RSA. Hamish extends his thanks to Kathleen and Tina for their fine fare. He also notes with pleasure the

#### **Karamea Community Update**

Mark Ibbotson recently wrote an article in the Chronicle about the Karamea Landfill. I think his main question was asking whether Buller District Council is making provision for a new landfill. I think this is a really good question, and as co-chair of the voluntary Karamea Waste Management Group (KWMG) I would like to make the following comments. I have not had a chance to discuss this with the rest of the group, but have discussed my response with Brian Jones who also co-chairs the group.

#### **KWMG**

The group's role is to act as liaison between the community and the BDC. We are currently confirming our relationship with an MOU with the council. Sue-Ellen is the Site Manager. She works for the contractor, WestReef. She communicates freely with our group but we have no direct role in her employment. We are very pleased to have her helping us with our recommendations to council.

#### Our history

We were set up in about 2013 when the council decided to rearrange its waste management systems. There was talk of Karamea joining in with the rest of the Buller, who now freight all their residual waste to Nelson (with the exception of another small landfill at Maruia). A small group of us objected to that and insisted that we continue to use our own consented landfill until the consent runs out in 2034, at least.

#### The present

We have a targeted rate and a separate account so that all money taken in by rates or gate charges goes into that account. All expenses come out of that account. It costs around \$80 000 a year to operate our landfill and to do our recycling. We have a small surplus that we have been trying to retain in order to undertake capital works in the near future. The annual cost per ratepayer is \$85 plus GST, plus any gate charges or plastic bag purchases. By way of comparison, Westport ratepayers are charged \$130 plus GST. There is a proposal that we will need to increase our charge to \$100 plus

GST next year. I think this is the first increase in seven years.

We are in the process of implementing some small changes to the way plastics are handled in Karamea in order to reflect market trends in accepting recycled plastic. We also hope to minimise our freight costs of plastics being freighted around the country by compacting them.

#### The future

Our group is very mindful that our resource consent runs out in 2034. Although the quarry site is unlikely to be full by then, we expect that the political climate for operating unlined landfills will have changed, and we are working on the premise that a consent will be difficult or impossible to obtain. With that in mind, we think we need to manage our waste now in a way that works towards 2034. This should mean every household reducing its waste in the first instance. Then anything that comes to the landfill needs to be re-used first, or then recycled. Failing all other options, the waste then goes to landfill.

In order to be more efficient at reducing the volume of residual waste, the KWMG is currently working with council to raise funds to build a Resource Recovery Shed. Council has made provision for this in its Draft Annual Plan which will have an opportunity for public input in the next few months.

#### What next?

Mark's letter has highlighted the need for KWMG to publicise what we are up to, and I apologise for a lack of recent communication. Our group should have a public meeting once a year for public input and for anyone to come along and share their views and join in if they wish. I will aim to do this in the next two months. There is also the opportunity for every person to make a submission to the Annual Plan which talks about how the council will spend its (our) money over the next year. I encourage you all to take part in that process. Our group will put in a submission to council on waste issues. We will try to inform our community of anything important when we see the draft document.

#### **Tomato Relish**

- 1.5 kg (about 10 medium size) Tomatoes, blanched, skinned & quartered
- 4 Medium size Onions, quartered
- 2 Tablespoons Salt
- 2- Cups Brown Sugar
- 2 & 1/4 Cups Malt Vinegar
- 3 Dried Chillies
- 1 Tablespoon Dry Mustard
- 1 Tablespoon Curry Powder
- 3 Tablespoons Flour
- 1/4 Cup Malt Vinegar

Cut small cross in top of tomato put in hot boiled water, blanch & skin.

Put tomatoes and onions into a bowl. Sprinkle with salt and leave for 12 hours.

Drain off liquid formed.

Put tomato & onions, sugar, first measure of vinegar and chillies into a pot.

Boil gently for 1 ½ hours, stirring frequently.

Mix Mustard, Curry, Flour and second measure of Vinegar to a smooth paste.

Stir into relish. Boil for 5 minutes.

Pack into sterilised jars.

Makes about five 350 ml jars.

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## Ōpārara Upgrade Project Update

#### March 2021

In 2018, \$5.7m Provincial Growth Funded was approved to upgrade McCallums Mill Road and the tracks and amenities in the Ōpārara Basin.

The Ōpārara Basin in Kahurangi National Park has significant conservation and biodiversity values. The Ōpārara Arch is the longest limestone arch in Australasia, while the Honeycomb Hill Caves systems are one of the largest cave systems in New Zealand and contain important fossil records.

The Ōpārara Basin hosts a wide range of biodiversity including the short-tailed bat, whio/blue duck, Powelliphanta annectens, great-spotted kiwi, kaka, kakariki, Simplicia buchananii, Asplenium 'calcicole', pukatea, the cave spider Spelungula cavernicolai and the silver fern.

Stage One Works are nearing completion, these works included:

### Box Canyon Toilet and Honeycomb Caves Security upgrade

The new flush toilet in the Box Canyon carpark is fully completed and has been used since December 2020 with no concerns. The existing long drop toilet will be removed over the coming weeks and the path rehabilitated.

Remote cameras and sensors monitoring the restricted area have been fully installed along the track to the Honeycomb Caves to help protect the delicate ecological area.

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#### **Winter School**

"Underneath government, both national and local; underneath commerce, there is a thriving system of time bartering, of trade and goodwill. Potluck teas, extra vegies for the neighbours, abundance shares; and the things we do in our small community without being asked, such as helping someone carry shopping to their car, giving someone a lift if you see them walking your way, and all the friendly waves that tell us we're on the Coast.

I've lived here in Karamea for 10 years and in being part of the Winter School volunteer team; I see those principles in this month-long event. Our community is full of creative, talented people who have skills to share, and stories to tell from their lives .

There are Winter and Summer schools elsewhere, but ours is different. We do not import experts from elsewhere. All tutors are either residents or have strong connections here. The tutors do not get paid,

though there may be a fee for any materials used. Those of us coordinating Winter School also do not get paid, and we do our best to make all workshops and events accessible for all. We have been lucky to receive funding from 'Creative Communities Buller', which covers our venue hire, which then helps the maintenance of our essential public buildings.

In past years, some of the winter school activities have been; Tile Mosaics, Felting, Knife Sharpening, Flax weaving, Dancing, Sauce making, Soap, Sauerkraut, Star gazing, Assertiveness, talks on Waste Minimisation, and Life in the Antarctic.

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





## Kahurangi National Park takahē numbers boosted

Article from This Quality News and DOC media release 18/03/21



The Department of Conservation Takahē Recovery team partnered with Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Tahu and Fulton Hogan to release the 15 birds into Kahurangi National Park.

The Takahē breed was released into Kahurangi in 2018. It was the first attempt to generate a new wild population.

"It's challenging to establish wild native species populations, and our monitoring of the Kahurangi takahē will inform our selection of new wild sites and how we manage wild populations," the Department of Conservation said in a statement.

When a transfer is planned for the birds, they get carefully put inside dedicated boxes.

Typically all the birds are transferred on Air New Zealand planes from Invercargill to Nelson, where they are then released into the wild.

The population is now at around 34 birds which gives it a boost to thrive.

#### Hi Karameans!

This week we are saving money in the kitchen again!

The banana-passion fruits are all over the place in Karamea and ready to be consume.

Let's turn this beautiful fruit of nature into a golden drink named wine...

#### For 23 litres of wine:

- 10 kg of fruit (without skin, slightly squizzed by hand to get the maximum of flavour)
- 4 kg of sugar
- 1 packet of SN9 yeast (or general purpose yeast)

Dissolve 4kg of sugar in water and fill a large bucket with cold water up to 25 litres.

Add the yeast to it and stir every day for 4 days, then sieve out the fruit pulp.

Put the wine in a fermenter under air lock.



Leave for minimum of 2 months but up to 6 month in big fermenter.

Have a taste sometimes to see where you are in the process, if the wine is too dry for you, add some more sugar to

Finally, bottle it (be sure that you don't bottle the yeast that sunk at the bottom of the fermenter) and leave another month before drinking.
